




Anna Filigenzi has partecipated in, and organised, several events during the semester:

- Has participated in the "CSACTI Summer School 2024: Power, Economy, and Society in Central Asia: Past and Present", Napoli, Palazzo Corigliano, 1st-4th July, with the contribution "The cultural impact of the Kushan Empire (1st-3rd cent. CE): Traditions, innovations and legacies" ABSTRACT: The paper discusses the epistemological weaknesses of our attempts to define the cultural history of the Kushans. The analysis takes into consideration: Archaeological sources (still scarce and fragmentary); Written sources (almost external, with the exception of few epigraphic documents); Numismatic evidence (abundant but somehow problematic); A global historical research almost based on uneven distribution and "cultural weight" of the available materials; The resulting unbalanced narrative, where Kushans appear as recipients rather than actors of cultural assets. To overcome all the challenges and hurdles, new research paths are needed. https://www.unior.it/en/node/2373

ABSTRACT: The presentation was dedicated to that

'gray zone' in our notion of tangible heritage, represented by ephemeral artistic productions. In particular, the focus was on how to restore and resocialise the ontology of the cultural heritage of pre-Islamic Afghanistan, mainly made of clay, stucco and wood. These formidable artistic traditions, which encapsulate a wealth of meanings, technical and material knowledge, local and trans-regional aspects, are only vaguely known due to the poor preservation of its physical remains.

With Chiara Visconti, has participated in the International Seminar "Beyond Borders: Tracing the Historical Dynamics and Transmission Models of Buddhism in Asian Contexts", 14-16 October 2024, Department of Asian African and Mediterranean Studies (UNIOR), with the contribution "Buddhism in birthdays, weddings, funerals and other occasions between South- and East-Asia". ABSTRACT: In general, ritual practices in the ancient world do not always occupy a clear place in history. Frequently, they lie in a grey area between prescriptions and proscriptions contained in the canonical and paracanonical literatures of the systems to which they belong, and the material traces – often difficult to decipher, - that may survive of them in archaeological contexts and the visual arts. In the case of Buddhism, the inclusive and dialogical nature of the project of diffusion outside its cradle-land generated, in encounters with different cultures, a variety of responses and adaptations, which reconverted into a Buddhist perspective the customs, traditions and expectations of the secular world strongly rooted in local pre- and non-Buddhist traditions. Of this vast and heterogeneous panorama, some case studies drawn from archaeological and arthistorical contexts ranging from the so-called 'Greater Gandhāra' (present-day

Afghanistan/Pakistan,1st-9th century CE) to Qing-era China (18th century CE) were presented. Their common denominator is precisely that capacity for 'transformative adaptation' that constitutes one of the reasons for the successful spread of Buddhism in Asia. https://www.unior.it/en/node/2496

Oxford: Oxford University Press. https://academic.oup.com/book/58197/chapter-abstract/481316135?redirectedFrom=fulltext This chapter starts with an overview of heritage linguistics, which is a new linguistic discipline primarily concerned with the study of heritage languages (immigrant minority languages spoken in diaspora contexts). The main goal of heritage linguistics is to describe and analyse the differences between heritage languages and their homeland counterparts, and to identify the sources or causes of divergence. One of these sources is cross-linguistic influence, as the unequal status of the majority (dominant) language and the heritage languages often leads to both lexical and structural transfer from the former to the latter. Among the

Austronesian languages, there are at least a dozen languages spoken by diaspora communities. The chapter focuses on five of these Austronesian heritage languages by providing an historical and sociolinguistic background, together with some salient linguistic features showing syntactic convergence on the grammars of the majority language(s). These five heritage varieties are Sri Lankan Malay, Cocos Malay, Javanese in Suriname, Javanese in New Caledonia, and Ambon Malay in the Netherlands. Giulia Forgione, (2024). New systematic studies of the clay monuments found by the Italian Archaeological Mission in Afghanistan (hereafter IAMA) in the 1960s and 1970s at the Buddhist archaeological site of Tapa Sardar, in the Ghazni area, are providing a deeper understanding of both the general context and the details of the decorations. This paper focuses on the row of thrones alternating with small stupas that were discovered in the pradaksinapatha around the Main Stūpa and assigned to the Late Period of the site (end of the 7th–8th/9th century CE). Although still far from the goal of comprehensively explaining the complex iconographic program of these monuments, we started itemizing significant details that, in spite of their apparently marginal character, are likely to have had a strong impact on the monuments' physical and symbolic definition. The rich array of their surface decoration, which combines a great variety of moulded motifs, was meant to convey the notion of preciousness. While the majority of those motifs may represent the portrayal of real jewellery, some stand apart for their unusual shapes, which depict gems in their natural state and may arguably be considered as having special emblematic meaning, such as the perfect, powerful, "pure" symbols of an unconditioned reality.

Abstract: This paper intends to analyse the contents of the dPal ldan zur mkhar ba khyad chos bye bya ba ring bsrel las grub pa'i ngag gi rtogs pa 'grol ba dā ki'i glu dbyangs (Dākinī's Song, Instantaneous Liberation through Realizing the Accomplished Speech from the Ten Million of Relics, Special

Teaching of The Glorious Zur mkhar ba) and the rDo rie tshig rkang dang 'brel ba'i lag len grigs su bsdebs pa (Systematic Collection of Practices Related to the Adamantine Verses). These alchemical texts—which are preserved in the Man ngag bye ba ring bsrel (Ten Million of Quintessential Instructions, The Relics, henceforth, Ring srel), a medical anthology authored by Zur mkhar ba mNyam nyid rdo rje (1439–1475)—are to be considered as particularly noteworthy for the multidimensionality of the mercury procedures they describe. In these scriptures, the entire process is devoted to both the obtainment of the mercurial panacea, endowed with therapeutic potencies and apotropaic virtues, and, from a higher spiritual perspective, the realization of an extraordinary body and the achievement of ultimate liberation. The pharmacological procedures are indeed deeply interrelated to and imbued with a contextual philosophical substratum, yogic and meditative practices, which were transmitted in diverse bKa'gyud spiritual lineages. Their analysis might allow us to better understand the place of medicoalchemical writings in the history of fifteenth century's Tibetan religion and philosophy, offering an insight into post-classical Mahāmudrā doctrines.

ISBN 9788866872795 ISSN 0582-7906. Abstract: This paper examines premodern Tibetan aphrodisiacs and rejuvenating therapies as found in the gSer bre chen mo, an authoritative fourteenth century medical anthology principally compiled by Brang ti dPal ldan rgyal mtshan of the Sa skya medical school. This complex corpus appears to be the result of a meticulous work of redaction to preserve medical, alchemical and ritual practices of diverse cultural origins, culled from a variety of earlier medical and tantric sources in order to build a systematic and exhaustive compendium. An interesting example of how this heterogeneous knowledge has been inherited and rearranged is represented by a series of pharmacological formulas, which are said to be drawn from the Tsa ra ka 'bum sde (Caraka's Collection in Hundred Thousand Verses) and other not identifiable ayurvedic and tantric works. The key constituents of these recipes are animal-derived ingredients such as lizards, salamanders, snakes mixed with otter and cat meat, ram testicles, sparrow head and eggs, bezoars, crazy honey along with many other herbal and mineral substances purported to be endowed with wondrous healing virtues. The remedies are considered to be multipurpose as can be inferred from the wide variety of therapeutic applications. The analysis of the mentioned recipes and the related procedures, which moved across written works, will allow us to examine the authorial strategies to ensuring continuity with the tradition through an adaptive reuse of earlier sources and eventually evaluate the crucial role of the gSer bre chen mo in the transmission of these operative disciplines in the Tibetan context.

Wacana 25(2): 165-188. https://scholarhub.ui.ac.id/wacana/vol25/iss2/2/ Abstract: This paper describes the encounters that Italian travellers, explorers, and traders had with the peoples of the Malay world at the turn of the century. In particular, it focuses on the linguistic descriptions and observations made by Italian explorers of the languages spoken in the places they visited and included in their travel writings. In addition to the pioneering work of Pigafetta, the Italian scribe who followed Magellan on his voyage around the world and produced the first "Italian-Malay vocabulary" in 1521, other linguistic descriptions and observations were made by Giovanni Gaggino, a merchant who compiled an Italian-Malay dictionary in Singapore, Odoardo Beccari, a naturalist who offered reflections on the Malay spoken in Borneo, and Celso Cesare Moreno, a ship captain and adventurer. Elio Modigliani, in his travels to Nias, Enggano, Mentawai, and the Batak country, provided detailed information on the local languages spoken in these islands in North and West Sumatra, while Giovanni Battista Cerruti, an explorer and ship captain who visited Singapore, Batavia, and the Malay Peninsula, commented on the languages, as did Emilio Cerruti, who travelled to the Moluccas and Papua. This paper focuses on how these languages were described and perceived by these nineteenth-century Italian travellers. It concludes that these explorers were all united by a common necessity, namely the importance of speaking local languages in order to be able to interact with the people they met on their travels. Malay, in particular, was always viewed positively as an international language, a powerful tool for communicating, learning, and interacting with others, and a beautiful language. Conversely, the other minority languages were seen as poor and simple, but still a powerful tool to overcome barriers and lay the foundations for intercultural communication.



RISE TWAI 9.1:33-40 https://www.twai.it/journals/rise/ Abstract The article discusses three films circulated in Indonesia and internationally between late 2023 and the very early months of 2024 that touched on uncomfortable and disturbing issues and truths that provoked criticism and approval: 'Dirty vote', 'Eksil', and 'Gadis kretek'. More importantly, the films prompted Indonesian and international audiences, in the hot period of the general elections, to reflect on issues of politics, violated human rights, and gender equality that partially mask very powerful economic interests.

- the 26th International Conference of the European Association for South Asian Archaeology and Art, Leipzig, Saxon Academy of Sciences and Humanities, 16-20 September 2024, with the contribution "Vaisravana/Kubera/Pancika/Pharro: Symbolism and Real Lifematters in Buddhist Sacred Spaces" ABSTRACT: The Gandharan iconographic repertoire includes several characters and scenes that at first look do not exhibit any explicit connection to Buddhist doctrine and praxis. However, it is exactly in this apparently stranger and heterogeneous universe that we may find the imprints of the worldly dimension of Buddhism. This seems to be the case with Vaisravana/Kubera/Pancika/Pharro, portrayed either individually or paired with their respective consorts. They undoubtedly share common ground, variously related to the concepts of wellness, wealth, and fecundity, and yet they are clearly individualised by means of specific iconographic traits. To what extent common aspects predominate on identity, or to what extent identity expresses significant differences (either functional or regional) is not clear, especially in the lack of sufficient archaeological data, which is to say, a sufficiently precise mapping of their original provenance and position. Available material evidence on this subject, though meagre, allows nonetheless some hypotheses to be developed. https://www.saw-leipzig.de/en/easaa
- the International Workshop "Votive stamped clay objects throughout the buddhist world: materials, texts and rituals" organised by the European Society for the Study of Central Asian and Himalayan Civilisations (SEECHAC), Paris, 19 November 2024, with the contribution "From Models to Models: Himalayan Tsha Tsha and their Rhyzomic Connections with Uḍḍiyāna". ABSTRACT: Although not unanimously accepted, the identification of the Uḍḍiyāna with Swat or, more verisimilarly, with a wider area centred on Swat, finds firm archaeological confirmation. This allows us to consider the Buddhist art produced in Swat and neighbouring regions in the second half of the 1st millennium, and particularly between the 7th and 8th centuries, as the most direct bridge to the beginnings and



developments of Himalayan Buddhist art. Indeed, studies based on archaeological data have progressively shortened the distances between the two worlds, revealing common repertoires of visual forms. Within this framework, although traces of the existence of objects equivalent to what we know as tsha tsha are tenuous in Swat and its environs, more substantial are the traces of rhizomic processes of transmission, reception and

transformation of patterns which also invest the tradition of small votive plaques. **Ubaldo Iaccarino** presented his work at several conferences and seminars, including:

Annalisa Bocchetti spoke at the Aga Khan Centre, London on 21-22/10/2024, at the Conference "Listening in Many Tongues: Multilingual Interpretive Communities and Acts of Translation in Early Modern South Asia." The event brought together scholars from various disciplines to explore the concept of translation beyond its literal meaning. Presentations delved into topics such as Ismaili



and Sufi studies in Persian and South Asian vernacular languages, the translation of texts in Apabhramsha and Sanskrit, and linguistic interactions between Arabic and Malayalam, with a focus on the cultural contexts of South India and Bengal. In my presentation, titled "Translating Sufi Artistic Vocabularies: An Analysis of the Adaptation of Usmān's Citrāvalī (1613) into the Maṣṇawī-e-Qiṣṣah-i Rāja Kunvar Sen or Rānī Citrāvalī (19th century)," I examined the dynamics of translation and adaptation of a vernacular Sufi poem in Avadhi from North India. My analysis highlighted the creative and spiritual processes involved in the cultural and linguistic transposition of a long-unexplored devotional poetic work.

Over the course of the event, we scholars have explored the concept through practices such as meditation, yoga, Sufi poetics, and ecstatic rituals, which have shaped modern disciplines, inspiring new cultural, artistic, and scientific perspectives on a global scale.
